Training Details

(Description of post)

This is a ST1 appointment in Orthodontics. This is a five year post (run through to ST5 subject to satisfactory progress at annual review). The post has been allocated a National Training Number.

The post is approved by the Regional Postgraduate Dental Dean in London, Kent, Surrey and Sussex for the training of Specialty Trainees in preparation for the Fellowship in Orthodontics and the Intercollegiate Specialty Fellowship examinations.

Successful completion of the first three years of the training programme will culminate in a recommendation by the Regional Postgraduate Dean to the GDC that the trainee is eligible for the award of a Certificate of Completion of Specialty Training. The following two years of training will be within London and Kent Surrey and Sussex but the precise location will be determined later during the first three years.

The post offers broad experience in all aspects of orthodontics and provides an exciting opportunity to be involved in providing orthodontic services to the local community. Duties include clinical sessions, and involvement in teaching and mentoring more junior staff. The post holder will be expected to treat a range of patients in accordance with departmental guidelines.

The post holder will be encouraged to develop their clinical skills and progress in the post, taking on increasingly complex patients and caseload. Whilst service delivery is important, contributions to the wider Trust/s in fields such as audit, outcomes, research management and teaching will be encouraged

Duties and Responsibilities of post-holder

Main duties and responsibilities

The appointed candidate will be expected to:

1. Active involvement in new patient clinics for the advice, diagnosis and treatment planning of patients referred into the departments.
2. Treat a wide range of malocclusions, including Multidisciplinary cases (Orthognathic/ minor oral surgery/ Restorative and Paediatric Dentistry)
3. Attend and participate in the running of MDT clinics
4. Active involvement and attendance at tutorials, lectures, journal clubs and organised teaching.
5. Undertake an active role in Research within the department.

Description of main training site

Barts Health NHS Trust

With a turnover of £1.25 billion and a workforce of 15,000, Barts Health is the largest NHS trust in the country, and one of Britain's leading healthcare providers serving a population of 2.5 million in east London and beyond. The Trust, established on 1 April 2012, consists of six local hospital sites: Mile End Hospital, The London Chest Hospital, The Royal London Hospital, Newham University Hospital, St Bartholomew's Hospital and Whipps Cross University Hospital. Barts Health is also proud to be part of UCL Partners, Europe's largest and strongest academic health science partnership. The Royal London is a leading, internationally renowned teaching hospital based in east London offering a full range of local and specialist services, which includes one of the largest children's hospitals in the UK with one of London's busiest paediatric Accident and Emergency departments. Home to London's air ambulance, The Royal London is also one of the capital's leading trauma and emergency care centres and hyper-acute stroke centres. The Royal London provides district general hospital services for the City and Tower Hamlets and specialist tertiary care services for patients from across London and elsewhere. It is also the base for the HEMS helicopter ambulance service, operating out of a specially built roof area. There are 675 beds, 110 wards and 26 operating theatres at The Royal London Hospital. The new building opened in February 2012 and is the largest stand alone acute hospital building in Europe.

The Department of Orthodontics

The Department is grouped with the Department of Paediatric Dentistry with clinical facilities on the 1st Floor of the Dental Hospital. The Orthodontic Department provides specialist training for an annual intake of 5-8 Postgraduate Students/Specialist Registrars on a 3-year training programme. The Department therefore houses 15-20 Postgraduate Students in Orthodontics. The department was completely refurbished in March 2017 as part of a new build with up-to-date clinical facilities arranged as a modern polyclinic.

A dedicated room has been allocated for Dolphin analysis, digitization or radiographs, tracing of radiographs and clinical photography. There is also a laser scanning room on the that is part of the Oral Biometrics laboratory, and clinical scientist support.

Description of second training site

Royal Free London NHS Foundation Trust – Chase Farm Hospital

The Royal Free Hospital was founded in 1828 to provide free healthcare to those who could not afford medical treatment. The title 'Royal' was granted by Queen Victoria in 1837 in recognition of the hospital's work with cholera victims.

For many years, Royal Free Hospital was the only hospital in London to offer medical services to women. This began a close association with the London School of Medicine for Women, later renamed the Royal Free Hospital School of Medicine.

Royal Free Hospital moved to its present site in the mid-1970s, bringing together the old Royal Free Hospital in Gray's Inn Road with the Lawn Road, New End and Hampstead General hospitals.

In April 1991 the Royal Free Hampstead NHS Trust became one of the first NHS trusts established under the provisions of the NHS and Community Care Act 1990.

On 1 April 2012 the trust was authorised as a foundation trust, under the name Royal Free London NHS Foundation Trust.

In 2014, Barnet Hospital and Chase Farm Hospital joined our foundation trust, bringing further medical expertise and local care to the NHS services we provide.

Barnet Hospital first provided healthcare in an infirmary in the Barnet Union Workhouse in 1838. Chase Farm Hospital began as a home for pauper children in 1884.

The hospitals were important to medical treatment during both world wars. Between 1916-18, 6,000 wounded and sick soldiers were given medical care at Barnet Hospital, and during the Second World War, Chase Farm cared for wartime casualties under the emergency medical scheme. In 2004 Chase Farm made European history, by carrying out the first total hip replacement procedure with the patient

leaving hospital in just 27 hours. At the time in the UK, the average length of stay following a total hip replacement was 11 days.
